Notes in alphabetical and ascending order




Simple time signatures, ie, time signatures in which the beat is of the value of an ordinary note (crotchet, minim etc)


The duration of sounds is shown by notes of different shape; periods of silence are shown by signs called rests

Key signatures, primary triads and dominant sevenths



Tenor, the Tenor being written an octave higher than actual pitch

ITALIAN TERMS

Ad libitum (ad lib) - at the performer's pleasure as regards the speed

A tempo - in time, that is, resume original speed

Accelerando (accel.) - accelerating, becoming gradually faster

Adagio - slowly, leisurely

Affrettando - hurrying

Agitato - agitated

Allargando - broadening out, often with an increase of tone

Allegretto - fairly fast

Allegro - fast

Andante - (lit. walking). At a moderate pace

Andantino - either a little slower or a little faster than Andante

Animato - animated

Appassionato - impassioned

Arco - with the bow (for string players)

Assai - sufficiently, very, eg allegro assai - very fast

Attacca - go on immediately (to next section of the piece)

Ben - well, eg ben marcato - well marked

Brillante - sparkling, brilliant

Brio - vigour

Calando - getting slower and softer

Calcando - hurrying

Cantabile - in a singing style

Capo - (lit. head) the beginning

Celere - nimble

Col, Colla - with the

Con - with

Corda - a string

Crescendo (cresc.) - becoming gradually louder

Da – from, of

Da Capo (D.C.) - from the beginning

Dal Segno - from the sign 'S.

Decrescendo - becoming gradually softer

Desto - sprightly

Diluendo - dying away

Diminuendo (Dim.) - becoming gradually softer

Divisi - divided

Dolce - gently, sweetly

Dolcissimo - very sweetly

Espressivo (Espress.) - with expression, feeling

E, ed – and

Energico - energetically

Fine - end

Forte (f) – loud

Fortissimo (ff) - very loud

Forzando (fz or sfz) - with a strong accent

Fuoco - fire

Giocoso - jocosely, humorously

Giojoso - joyfully

Grave - very slowly

Grandioso - grandly

Largo - slow and stately, broad

Larghetto - less slow than largo

Legato - smoothly

Leggiero - lightly

Lento - slowly

Ma - but

Maestoso - majestically

Mano destra (M.D.) – right hand Mano sinistra (M.S.) – left hand

Marcato - marked

Martellato - hammered

Meno - less eg meno allegro - less fast

Mesto - sad

Mezzo forte (mf) - moderately loud

Mezzo piano (mp) - moderately soft

Misterioso - mysteriously

Molto - much, very eg molto adagio - very leisurely

Moto - motion, eg con moto - with motion

Non - not, eg non allegro - not fast

Ossia - Or; the word indicates an alternative version

Ped - Depress the sustaining pedal of the pianoforte

Perdendosi - dying away

Pesante - heavily

Piacevole - pleasingly

Pianissimo (pp) - very soft

Piano (p) - soft

Più - more

Pizzicato (pizz.) - plucked

Poco - a little

Poco a poco – little by little

Pochetto, pochettino, pochino - a very little

Presto - very quick

Prestissimo – as fast as possible

Quasi - almost, as if, eg quasi lento - almost slow

Rallentando (Rall.) - becoming gradually slower

Risoluto - boldly

Ritardando (Ritard.) - gradually coming to a halt

Ritenuto (rit.) - hold back (ie slower at once)

Ritmico - rhythmically

Scherzo - a joke

Scherzando - playfully

Semplice - simply

Sempre - always

Senza - without

Sforzando (sf or sfz) - with a sudden accent

Simile – in a similar manner

Sordini - mutes

Sostenuto - sustained

Sotto voce - in an undertone

Staccato (Stacc.) - short, detached

Stringendo - gradually faster

Subito - suddenly

Tanto - so much

Tempo – speed of the music

Tempo Primo - resume the original speed

Tenuto - held, sustained

Tranquillo - tranquil, quiet

Tre corde - release soft pedal of the pianoforte

Troppo - too much

Tutti - all

Veloce - swiftly

Vivace - lively, quick

Vivo - lively

Volti subito (V.S.) - turn over quickly to the next page
